For all projects with a total dollar value above \$150,000 Notice of Final Settlement is required by C.R.S. §38-26-107(1). Final Settlement, if required, will be advertised in the same location as the original solicitation.

Project Description

This project will consist of interior demolition and renovations, as well as, limited exterior facade maintenance work to the existing Skyhawk Hall on the campus of Fort Lewis College.

The building is currently used as a classroom type facility consisting of three, approximately 1,000 square foot classrooms, one large group assembly/multi-purpose classroom approximately 35'-0" x 45'-0", and ancillary spaces including multi-stall men's and women's toilet rooms and necessary spaces for mechanical, electrical, janitorial and storage. Construction consists of wood frame, wood truss and shingled roof system, split-face concrete masonry unit wainscot and stucco veneer. Interior walls and ceilings are predominantly gypsum board painted. Flooring is typically 12 x12 VCT and ceramic tile in the restrooms, with sealed concrete in infrastructure related areas/rooms.

This renovation work will convert the classroom spaces into new specialized laboratory, office and support spaces consistent with a new nursing/medical related facility. An alternate bid proposal shall be provided to renovate the existing Toilet Rooms.

Scope of Services

The scope of services will include full Construction Contracting Services for the project specified during the process of construction, and warranty period to the State. Specific tasks to be performed by the Contractor include those generally performed by the construction community where the Contractor is the prime vendor to the State.

Minimum Requirements

Notice is hereby given to all interested parties that all firms will be required to meet all minimum requirements to be considered for this project. Interested bidders should be prepared to show evidence of the following to be considered as qualified, as a minimum:

- 1. Provided General Contracting services within the last three (5) years for at least two (2) projects each in excess of \$2,000,000.00 (hard costs), utilizing the expertise present in their Colorado Office; and
- 2. Demonstrated specific General Contracting experience in projects of similar scope and complexity specifically as it relates to hospital and medical office projects; and
- 3. Demonstrated bonding capability up to **\$2,000,000.00** for an individual project coincidentally with current and anticipated workloads; provide letter from surety that affirms this capacity.
- 4. Per C.R.S. §24-92-115 unless prohibited by applicable federal law, contract for any public project in the amount of one million dollars or more, that does not receive federal money, in the amount of one million dollars or more shall require the general contractor to which the contract is awarded to submit, at the time the mechanical, electrical, or plumbing subcontractor is put under contract, documentation that Identifies the contractors or subcontractors that will be used for all mechanical, sheet metal, fire suppression, sprinkler fitting, electrical, and plumbing work required on the project and certifies that all firms identified participate in apprenticeship programs registered with the United States department of labor's employment and training administration or state apprenticeship councils recognized by the United States department of labor and have a proven record of graduating a minimum of 15% of its apprentices for at least three of the past five years.
- 5. Per C.R.S. §24-92-Part 2, a public construction project in the amount of five hundred thousand dollars or more shall be subject to the State prevailing wage rate, of the regular, holiday, and overtime wages paid and the general prevailing payments on behalf of employees to lawful welfare, pension, vacation, apprentice training, and educational funds in the State, for each employee needed to execute the contract. Payments to the funds must constitute an ordinary business expense deduction for federal income tax purposes by contractors and subcontractors. Contractors are required to pay their employees at weekly intervals and shall comply with the enforcement provisions of C.R.S. §24-92-209. Contractors awarded a project of this size will be required to utilize the LCPTracker cloud-based labor compliance and certified payroll application.



- 2. **INCONSISTENCIES AND OMISSIONS:** Bidders may request clarification of any seeming inconsistencies, or matters seeming to require explanation, in the bidding documents at least three (3) business days prior to the time set for the opening of Bids. Decisions of major importance on such matters will be issued in the form of addendum.
- 3. APPLICABLE LAWS AND REGULATIONS: The bidder's attention is called to the fact that all work under this Contract shall comply with the provisions of all state and local laws, approved state building codes, ordinances and regulations which might in any manner affect the work to be done or those to be employed in or about the work. Attention is also called to the fact that the use of labor for work shall be governed by the provisions of Colorado law which are hereinafter set forth in Articles 27 and 52 of the GENERAL CONDITIONS. This includes the requirements for apprenticeship and prevailing wage on Public Projects.
- 4. **BID SECURITY**: A bid security of not less than 5% of the bid price is required when the price is estimated to be \$50,000 or more. The security shall be a bond by a surety company, the equivalent in cash, or otherwise supplied in a form satisfactory for the State. Noncompliance requires the bid to be rejected as nonresponsive.

- 5. **TAXES:** The bidder's attention is called to the fact that the Bid submitted shall exclude all applicable federal excise or manufacturers' taxes and all state sales and use taxes as hereinafter set forth in Article 9.3 of the GENERAL CONDITIONS.
- 6. **OR EQUAL:** The words "OR EQUAL" are applicable to all specifications and drawings relating to materials or equipment specified. Any material or equipment that will fully perform the duties specified, will be considered "equal", provided the bid submits proof that such material or equipment is of equivalent substance and function and is approved, in writing. Requests for the approval of "or equal" shall be made in writing at least five (5) business days prior to bid opening. During the bidding period, all approvals shall be issued by the Architect/Engineer in the form of addenda at least two (2) business days prior to the bid opening date.
- 7. **ADDENDA**: Owner/architect initiated addenda shall not be issued later than two (2) business days prior to bid opening date. All addenda shall become part of the Contract Documents and receipt must be acknowledged on the Bid form.
- 8. **METHOD OF AWARD LOWEST RESPONSIBLE BIDDER:** If the bidding documents for this project require alternate prices, additive and/or deductible alternates shall be listed on the alternates bid form provided by the Principal Representative. Bidders should note the Method of Award is applicable to this Bid as stated below.
 - A. **DEDUCTIBLE ALTERNATES:** The lowest responsible Bid, taking into account the Colorado resident bidder preference provision of Colorado law, will be determined by and the contract will be awarded on the base bid combined with deductible alternates, deducted in numerical order in which they are listed in the alternates bid form provided by the Principal Representative. The subtraction of alternates shall result in a sum total within available funds. If this bid exceeds such amount, the right is reserved to reject all bids. An equal number of alternates shall be subtracted from the base bid of each bidder within funds available for purposes of determining the lowest responsible bidder.
 - B. **ADDITIVE ALTERNATES:** The lowest responsible Bid, taking into account the Colorado resident bidder preference provision of Colorado law, will be determined by and the contract will be awarded on the base bid plus all additive alternates added in the numerical order in which they are listed in the alternates bid form provided by the Principal Representative. The addition of alternates shall result in a sum total within available funds. If this bid exceeds such amount, the right is reserved to reject all bids. An equal number of alternates shall be added to the base bid of each bidder within funds available for purposes of determining the lowest responsible bidder.

- **1.0 BIDS ARE REQUESTED FOR:** *SKYHAWK HALL IMPROVEMENTS FOR NURSING;* Fort Lewis College, in accordance with Drawings, Specifications and other Contract Documents prepared by *Natalie Mik, Steve Gates Architect, LLC, 1120 Main Ave., Durango, CO, 81301, (970) 259-0726;*
 - A. Examination of Contract Documents and Site: Before submitting a Bid, Bidders shall carefully examine the Drawings, read the Specifications, and other Contract Documents. Bidders shall visit the site, shall fully inform themselves as to all existing conditions and limitations, and shall include in the Bid a sum to cover the cost of all items included in the Contract Documents. Upon submission of his Bid, a Bidder shall be presumed to be fully familiar with the job site, conditions affecting the delivery and installation, and all requirements of the Plans, Specifications, and the Contract Documents. Failure to do so shall be solely the Bidder's risk.
 - B. <u>Preparation of Bid</u>: Bidders are required to use the bid forms contained herein. All blank spaces must be filled in with ink or typewriter; prices on the main Bid Form shall be in both words and figures, the written words shall govern. If the bid is sent by mail, use registered mail. Enclose the sealed bid envelope in the mailing envelope. The sealed bid should contain the following:

- C. <u>Delivery of Bids</u>: Deliver bid by the time and to the place stipulated in the Advertisement for Bids. It is the sole responsibility of the Bidder to see that his Bid is received in the proper time. Any Bid received after the scheduled closing time shall be returned to the Bidder unopened.
- D. <u>Withdrawal of Bid</u>: Any Bidder may withdraw his Bid, either personally or by written request, at any time prior to the scheduled closing time.
- E. <u>Validity of Bids</u>: Each Bid submitted shall remain valid and cannot be withdrawn for a period of thirty (30) days after the bid date.
- F. Completeness of Bid: The Base Bid shall include the cost for the work identified in the documents.
- 2.0 INTERPRETATION OF DOCUMENTS: If any person contemplating submitting a Bid is in doubt as to the true meaning of any part of the Drawings, Specifications, or other Contract Documents, or finds discrepancies in or omissions from the Drawings, or Specifications, he may submit to the Architect a written request for an interpretation or correction thereof. The person submitting the request will be responsible for its prompt delivery. Any interpretation or correction of the Documents will be made only by Addendum duly issued and a copy of the Addendum will be mailed or delivered to each person receiving a set of the Contract Documents. Neither the Owner nor the Architect/ Engineer will be responsible for any other explanations or interpretations of the Contract Documents.
 - A. All general questions regarding the Contract Documents should be directed in writing by mail or fax transmission to the office of the Architect / Engineer.
 - B. All questions regarding the project documents must be submitted no later than 48 hours prior to the issuance of the final Addendum. The final Addendum will be issued no later than two (2) working days prior to the Bid Opening date.

- **3.0 ADDENDA:** Any Addenda issued during the time of bidding forming a part of the Contract Documents loaned to the Bidder for the preparation of his Bid, shall be covered in the Bid, and shall be made a part of the Contract. Receipt of each Addendum shall be acknowledged in the Bid.
- **4.0 BIDDERS INTERESTED IN MORE THAN ONE BID:** No person, firm or corporation shall be allowed to make, file or to be interested in more than one Bid for the same work, unless alternate Bids are called for. A person, firm, or corporation who has submitted a sub-proposal to a Bidder, or who has quoted prices on materials to a Bidder, is not hereby disqualified from submitting a sub-proposal or quoting prices to other Bidders.
- **5.0 INDEMNIFICATION:** To the extent authorized by law, the Contractor shall indemnify, save, and hold harmless the state, its employees and agents, against all claims, damages, liability, and court awards including costs, expenses, and attorney fees incurred as a result of any act or omission by the Contractor, or its employees, agents, subcontractors, or assignees pursuant to the terms of this contract.
- **6.0 PRIOR APPROVAL:** The following procedure applies to all bidders requesting approval to bid materials and equipment equal to those specified as per State of Colorado Information for Bidders (State Form SC-6.12).
 - A. Equipment and/or materials manufactured by any one of the manufacturers listed in this specification or on the drawings shall be acceptable without prior approval.
 - B. Where no specific manufacturer is listed or a product is specified by performance or reference standard, any product meeting the specification may be provided without prior approval.
 - C. Requests for prior approval of materials and equipment not specified herein will be reviewed and/or considered for this project. Written requests along with three sets of performance data must be received by the Architect/Engineer no less than seven working days prior to bid.
 - D. Request constitutes a representation that the bidder:
 - 1. Has investigated the proposed product and determined that it meets or exceeds, in all respects, the specified product.
 - 2. Will provide the same warranty for substitution as for specified product.
 - 3. Will coordinate installation and make other changes that may be required for work to be complete in all respects.
 - 4. Waives claims for additional costs that may subsequently become apparent.
 - E. It shall be the responsibility of the bidder to assure that the substitute material and/or equipment fits into the space provided and meets all specified requirements. The bidder shall pay for all extra costs incurred by other trades for any and all changes necessitated by these substitutions.
 - F. Each bidder will be allowed one substitution request per item, equipment or material. The request shall itemize each of the proposed substitutions identified by applicable specification section, paragraph number, and/or drawing number. Performance data are to be included and edited to show specific data for the materials or equipment the bidder proposes to provide. Do not submit manufacturer's catalogs. The bidder is responsible for all additional costs associated with the use of a substituted product. This cost includes, but is not limited to, installation, re-design, special review, etc.
 - G. The Architect/Engineer will review the request for equality, suitability, and conformity of purpose. Material and equipment specified is used as a basis of standard, and while not specifically mentioned, material gauges, weights, appearance, and space requirements must be met by any substitutions. No substitutions that require significant deviations from the Contract Documents will be allowed.

H. During the bidding period, all approvals shall be issued by the Architect/Engineer in the form of addenda. Previously issued addenda will be distributed to all bidders with Contract Documents. The final addenda will be issued no later than two (2) working days prior to the bid opening date.

- 2. **EXAMINATION OF DOCUMENTS AND SITE:** The bidder has carefully examined the Bidding Documents, including the Drawings and Specifications, and has examined the site of the Work, so as to make certain of the conditions at the site and to gain a clear understanding of the work to be done.
